Professional Licensure Disclosure Statement Nova Southeastern University Shepard Broad College of Law

Per U.S. Federal Regulations, Nova Southeastern University Shepard Broad College of Law (NSU Law) provides the following disclosure related to the educational requirements for professional licensure and certification.

<u>Juris Doctor (J.D.)</u>: Because NSU Law is an American Bar Association (ABA)-approved law school, the Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree meets the educational requirements for eligibility to sit for the bar examination (required for professional licensure as an attorney) in all U.S. States as defined in 34 CFR §600.2. In addition to a bar examination there are character, fitness, and other state-specific requirements for admission to the bar in every U.S. jurisdiction. Moreover, specific licensure and certification requirements can vary by state. Because these requirements can change frequently and often without notice, it is strongly encouraged and is the responsibility of the student to ensure the student will meet all requirements for licensure in the states in which they seek to be licensed. Master of Law (LL.M.): NSU Law's LL.M. program is designed primarily for students who already have a J.D. Degree from an ABA-approved law school. Those students do not need an LLM to meet the educational requirements for eligibility to sit for a bar examination. Some students in the LL.M. program may be foreign attorneys without an ABA-approved J.D. degree. Those foreign attorneys who complete the LL.M. program may, in a few states, be eligible to sit for such a state's bar exam. However, all LL.M. students are solely responsible for compliance with the eligibility requirements of any state where that student seeks eligibility to sit for admission to the bar. The eligibility requirements vary by state and change, without notice. No statement or guidance from NSU Law can be relied upon or be a substitute for the student's own determination of the requirements and adherence with the required procedural steps.
